Grace Notes



The Cruellest Month

*April is the cruelest month,
breeding
Lilacs out of the dead land,
mixing
Memory and desire,
stirring
Dull roots with spring rain.
— T.S. Eliot*

I don't know when I've enjoyed a spring as much as this one. Where I come from, spring is short and muddy and full of nasty surprises: frozen ruts in the driveway thaw and trap the car in the mire; basements flood; doggy mementos are revealed by the melting snow in the yard; and last-minute snowfalls, as late as May, kill the hopeful crocus and snowdrops in the garden. Yet, spring is greeted with euphoria by most snow-country dwellers.

These mixed blessings are signs that endless winter will, in fact, end. Here in Sacramento, it's a different story. Maybe you have to be from the Northeast to fully appreciate these lines of T.S. Eliot. Maybe you need to be familiar with the teasing nature of a northern spring and its inevitable disappointments...or maybe not. Maybe the dark truth about spring is familiar to you, too.

The Easter story of resurrection is meaningless without knowing the Good Friday story of suffering and betrayal. The Passover story about the Angel of Death passing by the homes of the ancient Hebrews is only half of the story; the other half is that Death stopped at the doors of the Egyptians, sweeping away their innocent children.

The rebirth of spring holds a special poignancy for those who have endured a long winter. And the stirrings of life all around can be a torment for those who feel within them "the dead land" of grief, illness or depression. There is certainly plenty to be depressed about in these days of global warming, economic recession and war. The month of April with all of its life-affirming giddiness and excessive beauty can seem like a mockery of their pain.

Experts in these matters tell us that spring, along with Christmas, is the time of year when the most suicides occur. The contrast between the expectation of happiness and inner reality for those dealing with loss or loneliness can be too much. The feeling of being left out of the general rejoicing can feel like being the kid who isn't chosen to play; the insistent life – the warming sun and green shoots and nesting birds – may just throw into relief the sadness or emptiness of one who is depressed. If you or someone you know is finding April to be a cruel month, don't be afraid to talk about it. Remind yourself or your friend that beauty and amazement are still possible. Memory and desire can make us want to pull the covers over our heads or they can zap us back into life.

Perhaps not this month, or even next month, and often not without the help of others, but eventually, life will

have its say. Lilacs will bloom out of the dead land. The dark side of spring will bring meaning to the personal resurrection of hurting souls. The return to life is not without pain. This is the Easter story. Survival is not without cost. This is the Passover story. Spring rain will stir our "dull roots" and then we will flower and grow once more. This is the Spring story and it is also the nature of faith.

President's Message



Invoking Our Future

For this month's newsletter article, I'm submitting what was covered at the Community meeting that was held on Saturday, March 22. I know that not everyone could be there, so I thought this would be a good way to catch up. I hope that you will be curious about the presentation done by Eric Walle which I refer to in my speech.

Before we launch into the conversation, there are a couple of things that I want to mention very briefly here.

-As you may be aware, we are in the process of planning a move to two services. Hopefully all of you participated by taking the survey and attending the forum that was held after the Sunday service on March 30th which was dedicated to an overview of the survey results. -Our current by-laws state that Board members are elected to serve for a two year term. Wynne Skow, our current Secretary, will stay on the Board, but as a member-at-large. At the June congregational meeting, we will elect a new secretary. While the constitution is not explicit on this situation, I consider this action a reasonable interpretation of the constitution.

I think it is important to spend a little bit of time looking at some of the previous chapters of our story.

-Our church was established almost 20 years ago. From its beginning until October of 2006, we shared space with two different Methodist churches on Sundays. -We have had 3 settled ministers and 3 interim ministers. It was during this period of time that there was a convergence of many factors and our congregation took significant steps towards fulfilling our shared vision of having a place of our own, growing our membership and also becoming a full service church with a strong presence here in the local Sacramento/Elk Grove community. -Groups of people spent a tremendous amount of time and energy trying to figure out what would be a reasonable next step, where to go, what it would cost, how we would do it, etc. In addition to all the human capital required for this effort, we needed to come up with financial capital beyond what we what we were used to in the past. -This spending and income plan was called the Campaign for Growth (CFG). It was envisioned that this money would pay for the move in costs, furnishings, and one time start up costs. Additionally, it would help offset the increased monthly cost over the life of our lease. On December 31, the fundraising effort will officially conclude.

So, exactly how does the chapter close on the UUCG CFG effort?

-Based on projections about the funds that were needed over the life of our lease, a target amount of \$491,307 was set. The total result of the CFG effort netted a total of \$278,135. The good news is that the expenses are less than expected. -So, from a purely financial perspective, if we look at considering what money remains in the CFG funds against our actual expenses, we estimate that we are about \$180,000 dollars short of what is needed to take us through the end of our lease or the 5 year period.

We have so many really good things happening, all of them really positive, and I believe they are leading us down the path we desire to be on. We are invoking our future as we speak!

-We have enhanced our music program. Who does not love Loren and his musical expertise? -We have hired a new DRE and the Sunday children attendance is up. -Our average Sunday attendance is up on a regular basis such that we are really working towards two services, clearly a marker for growth. -We are getting off the ground, a social justice program which helps us fulfill the shared goal of greater presence in the community. -And most importantly, we still share the desire for our dream home and where the time, talent and treasure of all of us and those yet to come - provides the infrastructure that supports all of our endeavors.

Last September, a small group of us started to meet (Close the Gap Group) to reestablish a focus on planning our future. We quickly realized that we needed to look at the much broader picture, meaning that we need to work towards aligning all of our systems and every person who is a part of this community so that all of our efforts support the goals and vision for the church. [Eric follows with a presentation that does a wonderful job at explaining how we want to do this, and most importantly, explains how each of us can contribute to that effort]. Yes, we have some challenging issues ahead, but we also have incredible possibilities. And it is those possibilities and our vision that makes it really exciting to have a role in invoking this future of ours.

A mandatory parent orientation will be held near the end of May and classes will start on June 15. These OWL classes will all be held during the regular RE time.

With the end of the school year coming upon us so fast, the RE Committee has been hard at work coming up with exciting and fun ideas for this summer and for the 2008-09 school year. Here are some of the upcoming events that will be happening.

Drumming (Percussion) Group

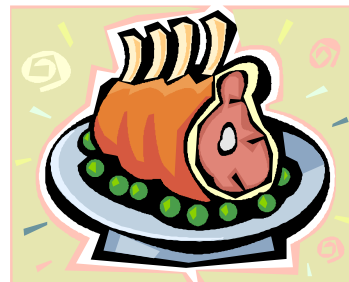


Theatre Group
