We're Growing...Now What?

Experts on church growth often talk about four kinds of growth. The first, the most obvious, and the kind that most churches tend to fixate upon, is numerical growth. We are so happy to report that our membership now stands at ninety-eight – an all-time record for UUC! But in their obsession with numbers, churches too often forget to ask themselves “why.” Why is it so important to have more members? The answer lies in mission. The purpose of a church is not survival, but service. Growing numerically is not an end in itself. New members mean that our message is touching more people. It means the chance to get to know more wonderful people who will change our lives. And larger membership allows us to pursue growth in spirit and service.

Organizational or structural growth is similar in that, it too, is not an end, but a means. Our committee structure and governance, our staff, our communications, the ways we support our members – these allow us to keep growing in other ways and to serve increasing numbers of members. How is UUCC doing in this area? As you know, we continue to struggle financially. But our Board and committees are strong and, for the most part, are growing in effectiveness.

You have heard a good deal about the possibility of reorganizing along the lines of the four ministries of Welcoming, Nurturing, Empowering and Serving. On March 22 – save the date! – Cilla Raughley, our Pacific Central District Executive, will be paying us a visit to facilitate a brainstorming session on how this restructuring would work, what it could look like, and whether or not it is a good idea. What would such a change mean to you? Might it help us better serve you, our members, and the wider world? It should be an interesting conversation!

Spiritual growth is the third kind, and the one that brings most of us to church. Together, we seek to live deeper, more meaningful and more joyful lives by exploring religious questions and uncovering our dearest values and longings. Our 11:00 service is well attended and our religious education program is flourishing. Our 9:30 service has several loyal attendees but continues to be smaller than we would wish. Still, it is providing an alternative kind of worship and opportunity for spiritual expression. Last month, we began a six-week “Sabbath Seminar” in which we are exploring various spiritual practices. You are very welcome to join us at 7:30 on Friday nights through the remainder of this month! Although spiritual growth is the expressed desire of so many, special programs for this purpose have not drawn many people. I welcome your comments and suggestions about how we might better nurture and support *your* spirit!

The final type of growth is in social witness and service to the wider community. Although many individual members are deeply involved in working for social change and in serving others in numerous ways, this has never been a strength of UUC. We're trying to change that. You turned out in great numbers and gave generously of your time, love and money to defeat Proposition 8. That loss left many of us feeling disheartened, but there is still so much to do! We are still feeling our way in this area. It's still new to us, but we will make a difference in Sacramento and Elk Grove with sufficient time and passion.

It has become trite to say that these are exciting times. But so much is changing! All around, we see new hope and new determination to make a difference in the world. The future seems to be opening up in new ways... And UUC is, too.

Minister's Discretionary Fund

Thanks to your generosity, we collected over \$600 for the Minister's Discretionary Fund on Christmas Eve. This fund is for the purpose of assisting UUC friends and members who are experiencing financial hardship. We expect the need for such assistance may increase during our current economic woes. Couples Checkup Offered

When a couple requests premarital counseling, Rev. Martha uses an online program called Prepare/Enrich to start the conversation. The program consists of an online questionnaire that reveals the strengths and potential problem areas of the relationship and highlights where the couple agrees or disagrees in their assessments of these. She then uses this report as the basis for her counseling sessions with the couple.

The “Couple Checkup” version of this service is designed to help married and committed couples build a more satisfying and intimate relationship. Just answering the questions stimulates thoughts and attitudes about the relationship. It is designed to activate dialogue, discovery, and increase the overall quality of your relationship.

The creators of the Prepare/Enrich program are currently offering a “Couple Checkup” at a discount (\$19.95) during the week of Feb. 8-15. There is no charge, of course, for the optional follow-up with Martha to discuss the results. Let Martha know if you are interested and she will provide more information.

Special Appreciation: Thank You, Paula

As you know, UUCC is celebrating a recent “growth spurt.” We are delighted to see so many new faces among us, including a number of parents with toddlers and school-age children! Our Director of Religious Education, Paula Braxton, deserves a lot of the credit for making our church so child-friendly. Our Religious Education program is growing, thanks in large part to the wonderfully creative work Paula is doing with our children.

Among many other accomplishments, Paula designed our Harry Potter-based curriculum; managed to offer “Our Whole Lives” (our sexuality education program) to our 5th and 6th graders despite our lack of budgeted funding for this; directed our marvelous Christmas pageant to the delight of everyone; has started “Wee UUs,” a regular meeting of parents of infants and toddlers; has redesigned our teaching schedule so that our volunteer teachers always have a “Spirit Guide” (a second adult) to assist them and are able to attend Sunday services on a regular basis — and so much more.

She has done much of this while working a second (full-time) job, attending Starr King School for the Ministry, raising two children along with her spouse Candy Wood, and fostering two year-old triplets! Paula, we are lucky to have you with us – and we know it! Thank you!

Of course, Paula could not do all this without our wonderful teachers and Spirit Guides and RE Committee. Our 11:00 AM service on Feb. 8 will be our second annual “valentine” to all our volunteers. Please plan to come and share in our mutual appreciation for all you and your fellow volunteers do to make UUCC the thriving and growing spiritual community that it is!



Pastoral Care Team: Up & Running

Three of our members (Jane Thompson, Susan Lange and Teri McKown) are working with Rev. Martha to establish a program of lay pastoral care. Of course, Martha is always available to talk with you; her commitment to supporting you in times of need has not changed. But now, we have an organized way for the members and friends of UUCC to supplement this care with additional support.

Our initial efforts are focused on providing short-term practical assistance to individuals and families who may need meals, transportation or moral support during times of illness or transition. If you or a friend at UUCC is ill or injured, has a death or birth in the family, is scheduled for surgery or is in need of some practical help for similar reasons, please let us know! We want to help. Contact Martha or Jane.

Our other initial project is to contact members who haven't been seen at church for some time. There are many reasons that someone may “disappear” for awhile: illness, emotional or family stress, job demands, financial problems, a conflict with someone, hurt feelings, dissatisfaction with some aspect of congregational life... And we will not know about it unless you tell us. Now, we will have a way to maintain our connections through difficult times. Again, if you notice that someone has not been around for a good while, do let Jane or Martha know so that we may check in with them and offer a listening ear or practical assistance.

Announcing Chalice Circle Options

Chalice Circles, or, as they are known in many other UU churches, Covenant Groups or Small Group Ministry, will be returning to UUCC after a long break! These small groups of seven to ten people meet twice a month for the purpose of building deeper relationships among their members through conversation and studies or activities of the group's choice. They allow us to experience the close community feeling that so many long for – a need for authentic and meaningful relationships that brings so many to church in the first place.

In a congregation of any size, getting together for gatherings other than Sunday morning worship is often hindered by our busy schedules. In a church the size of UUCC, this can be especially problematical. For that reason, we are offering you the option of choosing a Chalice Circle based on the time it meets or based on a pre-selected topic or shared interest.

Doin' the Numbers

It is time to submit our annual membership numbers to the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) and we are thrilled to report, it is official: WE ARE GROWING!!!

In 2008, we had a 20 percent increase in membership. After four consecutive years of having 82 members, our membership has jumped to 98, beating our previous record of 88 members. The chart below shows our growth since the birth of our church, 19 years ago.

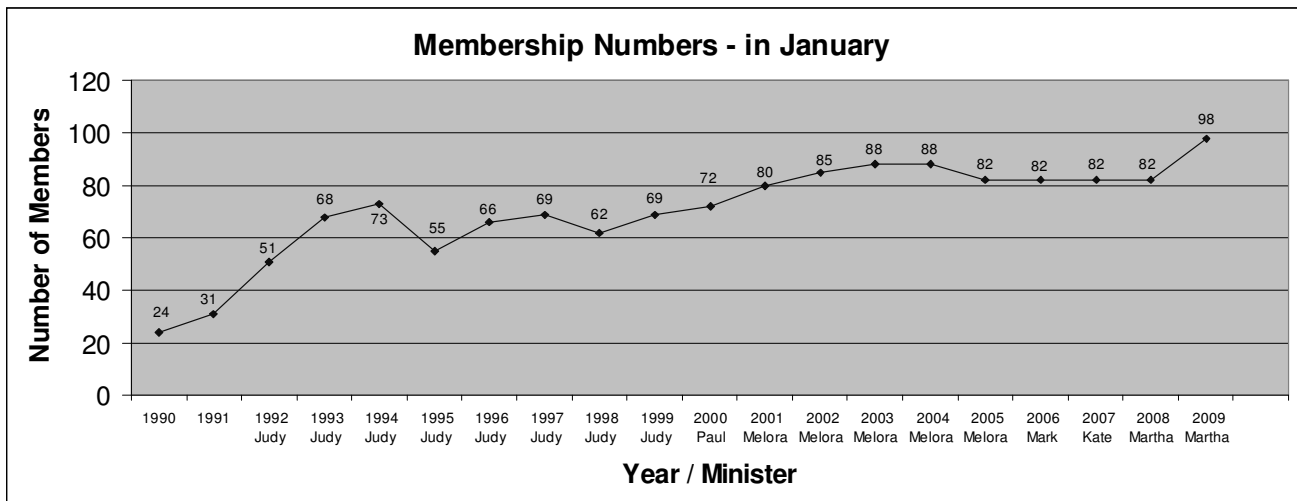
Our growth is no accident. It is something we have worked hard to do. Three years ago, we raised over \$250,000 among 82 members, plus some friends. This money was used to move to a new location, hire a pianist and Director of Religious Education, furnish and decorate our facility and help us afford the first few years of expensive rent.

Our church experienced many major changes all at once, including a change in ministers, a change from evening worship services to morning and a change in location. All those changes at once made it difficult to grow immediately. However, now things have settled and there is stability. And now too, comes growth.

Besides the membership numbers, other UUCG growth statistics look great:

- First time visitors – growing congregations usually have at least as many visitors in one year as the number of members. For example, with 82 members, we want at least 82 visitors during one year. Since 2006, we have gone from 75 visitors, to 84 in 2007, to 101 this past year. The great majority find us via the web.
- Returning visitors – The “best in class” statistics for returning visitors is considered 40 percent, meaning that of 10 visitors, 4 return at least once within 6 months. In 2007, 42 percent of visitors returned. During the church year of 7/07 to 6/08 a whopping 51 percent of our first time visitors returned. That’s over half! We don’t have 2008 data yet because we have to give people at least 6 months to return; however, our return rate will be over 40 percent again.
- Visitor to New Member – “Best in class” is 25 percent, meaning for every four visitors, one person becomes a member in that year. In 2007, we had 14 percent and in 2008, we had 20 percent. Improving, but still room to do better.
- Leaving Membership – Churches can expect to lose around 10 percent of their members each year. In 2008, we lost only 5 percent, but the previous year we lost 15 percent and 10 percent in 2006. Average is 10 percent overall.
- Number of people at church (infants to adults) on Sunday morning has been increasing also. Average attendance in the last 3 years went from 50 to 60 to 66. Not bad!

Repeatedly, newcomers tell us we are a very friendly church. When looking out over the sea of people during social hour, it is heartwarming to see so many people take the time to reach out to new folks. To those who are new to our church, thank you for being a part of us. If there is anything we can do to help you with the transition into our community, please let Rev. Martha know.

UUA & PCD Dues Request

When our church was founded, we received assistance and money from the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). As we built the church up, the Pacific Central District (PCD) provided us with guidance, money and other support. In return, we agreed to pay our full dues as members of the UUA and PCD.

Many congregations wrestle with the issue of whether they should include UUA and PCD dues in members' pledges or have members contribute the dues as a separate amount. When our church began operating, we decided that membership in these UU organizations was an important aspect of our identity and a big source of support. As a result, we have included the annual dues in the budget, now \$79 per member, which the church covers as part of our operating expenses.

Our congregation is facing significant financial challenges this year. The growth in our congregation as we celebrate having 98 members is very helpful. However, we will have to increase our fundraising efforts. One way in which we as members can help our church is to contribute an additional pledge to cover our UUA and PCD dues.

A number of us have already made this additional contribution at the end of 2008. We, the Board, thank you for your generosity. If you did not have a chance to participate in that opportunity, you can still help. The additional pledge of \$79 for an individual or \$158 for a couple will help our congregation continue to thrive.

UUCC serves as a resource to the community. It is a place where each of us can reflect on larger issues surrounding our lives. Our church is a place where we can spend time with friends and others with similar inquiring minds. And our church is a community in which we can find support when our lives are buffeted by uncertainty or difficulties.

If each member can make an additional pledge to cover our UUA and PCD dues, it will pay for a couple of months' worth of operating expenses. This helps provide time to expand membership further and undertake additional fundraising efforts which will be necessary to continue functioning as we have been.

If you are not able to expand your pledge for this additional cost, please do not feel pressured to do so. It is important that each member feel comfortable that their pledge of assistance to our congregation is not a hardship, but a freely given contribution to support our church. If you can afford to give more, on behalf of those who cannot afford as much, please consider doing so.
