The Stories We Tell

The current offering of "Building Your Own Theology" is coming to a close. There's been plenty of laughter and the conversations have been thoughtful and revealing -- revealing to ourselves, especially. We have asked questions that helped to uncover our own values, beliefs, meanings and convictions as we gradually constructed our personal credos. One of the earliest exercises we engaged in during this process was the writing of our spiritual autobiographies. If you've never tried this, it's a project that you might find interesting and useful. These are the steps suggested in this curriculum by the Rev. Dick Gilbert:



- First, we looked at the meaning of places in our lives; what were the settings in which significant events in your life occurred. Gilbert calls this "mapping the spirit."
- Next, we identified three or four people who have had the greatest impact on our lives.
- This was followed by two or three "formative experiences," that is, events that left a lasting impression on our understanding of who we were or how the world worked.
- We then thought about what communities have had a lasting influence on us.
- Next, we considered the important decisions of our lives, what they meant to us, how we made them, and their results.
- Finally, we identified a few of the happiest and saddest experiences or moments of our lives.

After reviewing these places, people, events, choices and emotions, we were ready to try to discern our "master stories." If you were a novelist constructing your life, what would be the themes that ran through your narrative? What has been your dominant motivation, for example? What have you been trying to accomplish or what are the recurring frustrations you've encountered? How have the people and events in your life changed you? Is there a pattern, or patterns, in your life? It's useful to occasionally take this "authorial view" of our lives and the themes that run through them because this is how we detect the values and meanings that we have, perhaps unknowingly, assigned to life. The stories we tell ourselves about ourselves are a rich source of information about

how we understand the larger world. Is it a safe or hostile place? Do we understand people to be basically, good, bad or indifferent? On what or whom do we depend? What do we hold to be most important to our happiness and fulfillment? These are all "theological" questions, whether or not we believe in God.

Our stories are, in a sense, our very lives. Our lives are experienced through the narratives we create about them. This is the basis of "doing theology" and we are all theologians as we construct such stories about ourselves and our encounters with the world. It is these stories that reveal our deepest struggles, joys and convictions. Truthfully and passionately examined, these stories help us understand the unquestioned sources of our beliefs, and more importantly, the choices these beliefs compel us to make about how we will act in the world -- our personal imperatives. This is indeed a worthwhile project. This is the project in which we are all engaged in this challenging faith that is Unitarian Universalism.

Thinking Ahead to our "Early Service": Worship Matters

Look to this space each month to present information about the new "early" service (9:30 am) that we will be starting September 7. This month we will discuss the new service from the perspective of worship.

Our Sunday worship service has many components. We sing, we celebrate, we pray or meditate, we come together in community to listen to the message of our min-

ister or worship leader. While we include a moment for quiet contemplation, for many, there is limited opportunity for connection to our deeper spirit. Our new early service will allow us to have a special time for those who seek spiritual depth though an experience of the *Sacred*.

Reverend Martha has outlined her intention for this new service. "The service should be a kind of collective spiritual practice, using poetry, readings, music, imagery and silence. I would like people to leave the service feeling peaceful and spiritually renewed." Our new service will be 45 minutes long and will have no children's time or sermon. While the emphasis will be on the "spiritual," these services will be thematic and will offer something for the mind as well as the heart.

Does this idea resonate for you? Do you have friends or family who you think would find meaning in this type of service? We hope this information will start you thinking about what this new form of worship may mean for you. *If you prefer our current worship structure, be assured that our later service (11 AM) will remain much the same as it is now.*

The Worship Committee begins planning for the new service at a retreat this summer. Justice Coordinating Team

The UUCC Board has approved the formation of a committee to coordinate the social and environmental justice efforts of our congregation. Julia Walle and Antonio Gonzalez are co-chairs of this group that is currently focused on organizing UUCC's response to the proposed ballot initiative to amend the state constitution to ban same-sex marriage. They will be keeping us all informed of how we can most effectively work together in this very important effort. The other issue they are looking at is climate change. These are the congregation's two greatest justice concerns, as indicated in last fall's survey. Here is the committee's charter:

The Justice Coordinating Team is a serving ministry that reflects and is grounded in our Unitarian Universalist values and will perform the following core functions:

- Discern congregational justice related interests, talents and resources
- Discern community needs and opportunities for justice-related coalition building & collaboration with fellow UU's, UULM, interfaith partners and other allies
- Create and implement a justice-making plan for congregation engagement and monitor an annual calendar of events
- Evaluate results of core activities
- Communicate justice related activities and information in an on-going manner with members of the congregations
- Increase awareness of and engagement in UU denomination-wide justice ministries
- Provide opportunities for congregation related leadership development

Helping Hands

Carbon Rings: Losing 1,000,000 Pounds of Carbon Emissions

The goal is for households in UU congregations in California to reduce their total carbon emissions by 1,000,000 pounds by Earth Day 2009!

Two groups of UUCC members have been holding weekly meetings over the past month to learn about ways to reduce our carbon footprint on the earth, using a program designed by the Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of California (UULM-CA). These groups, called Carbon Rings, have been reading and discussing articles expressing a variety of perspectives on climate change. Members have also shared their own struggles and feelings about this issue.

The remainder of the series of eight sessions will be devoted to helping each other identify and make changes in our lifestyles so as to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 5000 pounds per household.

Sound like something you'd like to do? Please, stay tuned! We hope to organize more Carbon Rings in the fall.

Rev. Lindi Ramsden Honored

Our fellow-member and director of the Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of California, Lindi Ramsden, received the "Freedom of Worship Award" at the Sacramento Stonewall Democratic Club's Fifth Annual Four Freedoms Awards Dinner. Lindi was duly recognized in honor of her tireless work to keep discriminatory language out of the California constitution and to oppose attempts by the religious right to impose their conservative religious values on the rest of us.

UCCC Speaks Out

These two letters to the editor were both printed in the Sacramento Bee in the days following the historic decision by the State Supreme Court.

First, from our member, Allison Claire:

I am overjoyed by the California Supreme Court's decision on same-sex marriage. Five years after we spoke our wedding vows, my partner and I may finally be able to get the license that makes our marriage a legal reality.

Teri and I have been a committed couple for almost seven years, and she is the adoptive parent of our three children. The lack of legal recognition of our marriage has been a source of pain for our entire family.

It has been especially difficult to explain to the kids why we aren't married in the eyes of the government, even though our religious community, our extended families, and our friends from all walks of life acknowledge us as a married couple and as a family equal in worth and dignity to any other.

Now, at last, California also recognizes that our love and our commitment matter. I am well aware that opponents of same-sex marriage are already planning an initiative to amend the state constitution and permanently establish discrimination. I trust that they will fail, and look forward joyfully to the day when our children can know that their parents' marriage is legally recognized.

And from our minister, the Rev. Martha Hodges:

Today's court decision declaring that government cannot dictate who may marry is a victory for all loving couples.

As a Unitarian Universalist minister, I have been privileged to perform religious weddings for gay and lesbian couples whose vows have gone unrecognized by the state of California.

These have been among the most moving wedding ceremonies in my experience. My eyes have filled with tears as the straight families and friends of these couples, faces shining with love and joy, gave their blessings to the couple. These couples have often been together for years, through thick and thin. Like any couple, they are full of hopes and dreams for their future together. Now I will finally be able to sign a marriage certificate testifying to the legal status of such marriages.

Any two people who make the lifelong commitment to each other that is marriage deserve our affirmation. The choice to marry is a courageous and faithful act, one not to be denied by any government. I celebrate this day when the spiritual commitment of two people in love can now be fully recognized by the state, regardless of the couple's sexual orientation. Today, the Court spoke out for equal treatment under the law for all Californians. It has declared that this is a state where we are all entitled to be treated with dignity, fairness and respect.

Marriage Petition



There is great rejoicing that the California Supreme Court ruled marriage between same sex couples is a right. Within just thirty days, marriage of same sex couples will be recognized as legal in the state of California. However, the threat is not over yet as there may be an initiative on the November ballot to make same sex marriages illegal under the California constitution.

Persons collecting signatures were often paid by the number of signatures collected and frequently tried to persuade people to sign the petition by giving the impression that signing the petition might actually help ensure the right to same sex marriage. UULM oversaw efforts to stop persons from signing this petition by manning the supermarkets, stores, etc. and educating people on the important facts.

Many members of our congregation were active in those efforts. It is not yet known if the same sex marriage measure will be on the November ballot, but it looks like it is a good possibility. Currently, signatures are being counted and validated. However, the efforts of members of our congregation and others lessened the number of signatures and made people pause and consider this issue more carefully.

We would love to see lots of our members in the parade. It begins at the historic Capitol Park at 10 am and winds its way through the downtown district to the festival grounds at Southside Park.

We would also like to set up a vendor booth with two or more people available to answer questions about UCC, hand out literature, etc. It is especially important that the LGBT community find out about us now that we are able to perform state-recognized same-sex weddings.

If you plan to walk in the parade or can help represent us at the booth, please let Rev. Martha, know as soon as possible.
