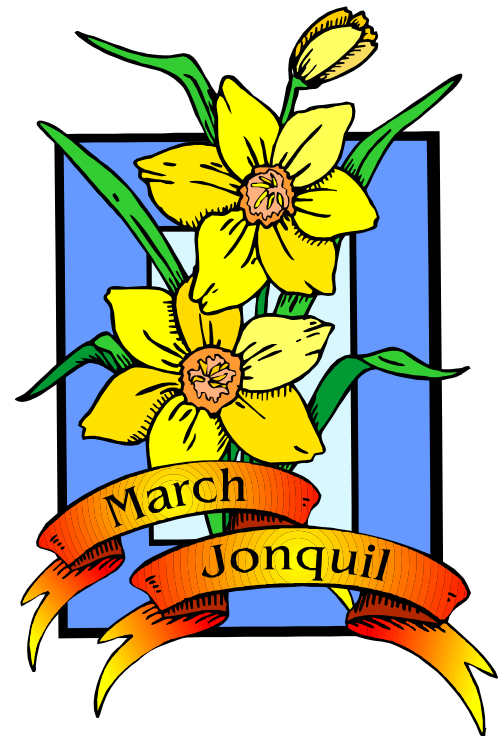

From Our Minister: Kate's Corner

UUCC has more than our share of clergy. Two of our members are community ministers and two others are in preparation for the ministry. I am your interim minister and next month you will be voting on calling a “settled” minister to your pulpit. You have two former settled ministers and two former interim ministers. You once had an intern minister. I bring this up because you are in relationship with so many clergy and about to consider welcoming another. Each UU minister has a different relationship to a congregation and to one another than we would if we were laity. Each category of ministry has certain challenges, rules, and understandings.

Community ministers are UU ministers whose primary employment is not based in a single congregation, but rather with a group of congregations or some organization that serves people in some other way. This includes such ministries as hospital chaplain, prison chaplain, military chaplain, police chaplain, pastoral counselor, and heading or working in various social agencies. In our congregation, we have Lindi Ramsden who works with the UU Legislative Ministries and Jackie Kelly who is a chaplain with the VA. Our Board has recently taken action to endorse Jackie so that, although she works with the VA, we will also recognize her ministry and be a major contact for her with Unitarian Universalism. As part of this relationship she will, from time to time, at the request of your settled minister, assist the congregation. Community ministers are a growing portion of our ministry as we seek to extend ministry beyond our churches and into the world. Community ministers’ presence and involvement in our congregations can serve to help us look outward.

Seminary students are not yet ministers, of course, but soon after they enter seminary and definitely after the first year they are strongly encouraged to give up roles that are more appropriate to the laity. If I am not the settled or interim minister in a congregation, a minister or minister-in-training needs to check with the settled or called minister about any significant role we might play in the life of the congregation. Generally, we would not serve on the Board, for example. We would have to be careful to be supportive of the settled minister and not get involved in any controversy surrounding a settled minister. Oftentimes the settled minister will encourage and support seminarians in taking on roles within a congregation that they may later perform in their work: preaching, teaching, or leading a covenant group might be examples of those roles. The

transition to becoming a fully recognized UU minister is a long process and most who begin it do not finish. It takes at least four years of graduate level seminary, an internship, many evaluations, chaplaincy training, and a final thumbs up from the Unitarian Universalist Association’s Fellowship Committee. Once recognized, it takes at least three years of service as a minister and annual evaluations before the preliminary process is completed.

Interim ministers, as most of you know by now, are ministers who agree to work for a congregation for an agreed upon length of time which lasts no longer than two years. As the name implies their task is to serve congregations who are in a time of transition — usually after a previous minister has left and before the next one is settled. Unlike settled ministers, they are “hired” by the Board of Trustees. They must leave after their contract is complete and cannot serve a church where they have served as interim for a period of several years. Some ministers are accredited in the interim ministry (AIMs) and that is their primary career path. They have special training and annual educational events. Others, like myself, are UU ministers without the special accreditation as interims who are only temporarily serving in that capacity.

The settled minister, the minister for whom you are now in search, is chosen by the entire congregation — “called” to the ministry of UUCC. Although the search committee will recommend a candidate to the congregation, that candidate is not your minister until you vote to call her or him and she or he accepts that call. Few accept a call unless almost all of the congregation has voted for the call. Because that minister was chosen by the entire congregation, any clergy or clergy-in-training do all that we can to support our colleague’s ministry and defer to that call. This is one reason that former ministers of a congregation severely limit our involvement — we want the congregation to move on and we want to defer to our colleague’s call. There are varying levels of involvement of former clergy, but we are forbidden from direct involvement in the ministry and politics of a church we no longer serve, and, generally, it is better if we can find another church home. Having been a minister for 17 years in one congregation, it is hard for me to imagine trying to go to that congregation when I was no longer their minister. My investment was so great, it would be hard to be circumspect. My tongue would have tooth marks. I do get Christmas cards, the newsletter, and e-mailed baby pictures, and some of those I knew best get occasional updates on my career and family.

This last month was quite productive around here. "Membership" as a committee concept has been given a major boost of energy. The group that attended the recent Growth Day put on by the Pacific Central District (PCD) has really taken hold and is evolving as the new "Membership" committee. This energy and direction is going to be visible in how we greet newcomers and in what value we offer to new members. You'll hear more about this soon. The other major breakthrough was at a meeting of the Board with the Finance Committee and the Campaign for Growth Committee (CFG) about the state of our finances and the ongoing operation of the church. The Campaign for Growth is still very much alive and about to get much more attention. The core members have been Chris Carter, Gina Guarneri, Maggie Melnick and Terri Riley. They and many others get major "Thank You's" from the Board and members of this church. Their guidance and input has been crucial in getting us moved into our new church home.

As we progress, the functions of the Campaign for Growth (CFG) are changing slightly. We have covered two main strategic goals thus far (moving into this church and providing for Interim and Settled minister coverage). But the effort cannot end with this. The early emphasis on facilities and purchasing now gives way to the need for ongoing financial support of the church. Ongoing church administration has been shifted to the Church Operations committee (with Board support). Now we need to continue focus on the goals we have set for the current three- and five-year plan under which we are operating. That is succinctly: to raise, track, report and administer the funds we need to ensure that we continue to grow. We have much left to accomplish. New CFG members are needed to carry on. Therefore, the CFG is being revitalized and reorganized. It is closely related to the Canvass committee. And hence like the Canvass committee, it is now a sub-committee of the Finance Committee, allowing it to get the guidance, support and encouragement it needs to carry on its charter. Both Canvass and CFG are vital to our present and future, and as such deserve all the support of the Finance Committee and the Board. CFG will be more visible again in the near future.

Canvass is about to kick off our annual Operating Fund campaign. This will be a big and exciting year as we bring in a new settled minister and continue all our marvelous programs. We are UUCC!

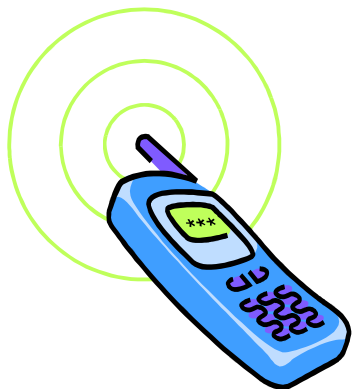

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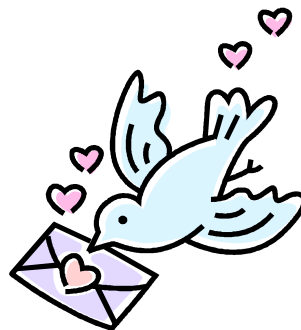
First Sunday Collection

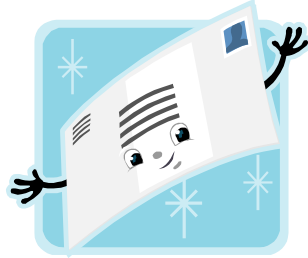

New Community Minister

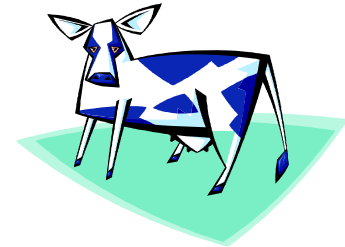
Dear Members and Friends of UUCC,
I am very happy to introduce myself as your new Community Minister, having been given this responsibility and honor on your behalf by the Board and your Interim Minister Kate Rodhe. What this means is that rather than being called to parish ministry by UUCC, I am endorsed to do ministry in the larger community with principled and relational mutual support to and from UUCC. I have already met many of you at church services and I look forward to meeting and getting to know as many of you as possible. I have been a fellowshipped minister with the Unitarian Universalist Association since 1993 and earned my Master of Divinity in 1994 from Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley. Last September I moved to the Sacramento area to become the chaplain and Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) Supervisor Candidate at the VA Medical Center in Mather. Heifer Project

The Religious Education Middles Program (2nd – 4th graders) asked for donations to the Heifer Project as the February 1st Sunday Offering. The children learned more about the Heifer Project and their goal to help people around the world help themselves through donations of farm animals. The congregation responded very generously and the children then had to decide how to spend \$450. Using the 5th principle of democratic process, they discussed and voted on the merits of giving sheep for wool and weaving, chicks and ducks for eggs, rabbits for meat and manure and water buffalo for plowing. In the end, they went for purchasing an entire pig and share of every other item including several shares of tree seedlings and bees. The children filled out the order form and are proud of their contribution to our world community.

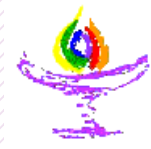
PCD Currents
