Grace Notes

The name of this monthly column reminds me to look for blessings in unexpected events and places. This month, I'm considering what "grace" may be hidden in the necessity for me to reduce my hours by twenty-five percent.

The most important gift I'm reminded of is that I have work that I love and that matters. I'm in a lucky minority there. I'm reminded of the goodwill and affection that I share with the members of this congregation – another blessing that not all ministers enjoy.

Then there are the practical aspects of my "furlough." I've decided to take the third full week of every month as my unpaid leave. This will, I hope, be less disruptive to the church than if I cut back a little here and a little there. Of course, I am available for pastoral or other emergencies during that week. I will be preaching twice a month, for the most part. The extra Sundays off will be ably covered by our fine lay preachers and seminarians.

I know many of you are concerned about my finding other work to make up the difference in my income. As of now, I may possibly be working one quarter time at a nearby fellowship, but that's still uncertain. Regardless, I am fortunate to have a retirement fund from my life before ministry on which I can draw as needed.

On a personal level, I intend to use my time off wisely for study and recreation. This will be an opportunity for me to learn to practice better self-discipline and self-care. In other words, I'll resist the temptation to give into my vices of reading mysteries and doing Sudoku! (Well, maybe not entirely.) It occurs to me that I indulge in those two particular forms of escapism because they both occupy the front of my mind while leaving my deeper thoughts to wander. They also both offer the reassuring illusion that the puzzles of life have clear answers that can be methodically discovered! At any rate, I intend to structure my time off so that I don't fall into my naturally nocturnal schedule. I'll take some day trips and get to know the area. I'll work on my spiritual life and maybe use some of my Sundays off to visit other places of worship. And, of course, I'll catch up on my reading and housekeeping and organize my life!

This arrangement would not have been anyone's first choice, but we will all make the best of it. We have lots of work to do together in the coming months and years and we will do it with joy and determination and, yes, grace.

Board Updates

I would like to thank everyone who took part in the Congregational Meeting on the budget. The Board listened to comments, and reviewed notes at our last meeting. Two messages that were very clear were that we need to make more information available on our finances and financial discussions, and we are concerned about the reduced hours for Rev. Hodges.

The Board voted to make more information from the Board meetings available on our website. We will be posting Board agendas at least a few days prior to meetings. We will also post the monthly financial reports with the status of our finances. Following meetings, we will post the draft minutes. This will provide everyone an opportunity to stay informed on church issues.

The Board meets on the second Tuesday of the month, at 7:15 PM at the church. On occasion, the date moves a day one way or the other, which will be reflected in the minutes of the previous month's meeting and on the agenda. These meetings are public and open to the congregation. Board members have name tags which indicate that they are on the Board. If you would like more information or to voice your opinion on an issue facing the church, I encourage you to speak with members before or after services.

At our August meeting, the Board did approve the Committee on Ministry recommendation that Rev. Hodges receive a 3% cost-of-living raise, although we are unable to restore her hours.

The "church year" begins in September, as we return from vacations, and children re-adapt to the school year schedule. This will be a great year with our Religious Education Program growing, and services by Rev. Hodges and our Worship Committee. I look forward to seeing you in church!

Lessons from our Community Meeting

Thank you to all who made time to stay after church last month to talk about our budget and the challenges it presents. A very special thank you goes out to Karen Gunderson and Doug McDougall for their skillful facilitation of this meeting. Although people spoke with passion about these issues that so deeply concern them, the meeting was remarkable for its civility and inclusiveness. We have demonstrated that the ties that bind us together are so much stronger than the anxieties or differences of opinion that are inevitable and normal parts of congregational life.

The Board listened carefully to your comments and concerns. At the conclusion of the meeting, we broke into small groups to formulate suggestions on the "next steps." Here is a summary of what you said, and the Board's responses to your requests:

- Return the minister to full time or at least restore some of the hours cut. Much to everyone's dismay, this just does not seem to be possible for this fiscal year. Apart from our rent, the minister's salary and housing are our largest expenses; cuts in other areas help to balance our budget but they just cannot make enough difference in our bottom line. We are all determined that next year will find us in a position to restore her hours to 100%. Rev. Martha is waiting to hear if she will have quarter-time employment at another church for the remainder of this year. For this reason, a cut in her hours of less than 25% are not in her best interests. In the meantime, the Finance Committee has returned a large portion of Martha's '08-'09 pledge to her to help minimize the impact on her personal finances. We will also attempt to build a reserve fund with an eye for applying it to next year's budget.
- Base the minister's 75% on a salary that includes a 3% raise. This has now been done.
- Devise a formula for allocating any additional monies to competing needs. The Board will be addressing this as we continue to work on raising funds. Your input is encouraged, as is your presence at Board meetings, the second Tuesday of each month, 7:15-9:00 PM.
- Analyze the drivers of membership growth. The Membership Committee will continue to track our visitors and attendance with the wonderful help of Laura Osborne. They are also looking at ways to help newcomers make connections here through the introduction of Chalice Circles (see page 7) and a "buddy system" (see page 6-7). We hope for a renewed community presence under the guidance of Allison Claire, who will be heading up our Serving Ministry that includes Social Justice. The main reason people come to a new church and decide to stay is the people there. You can help us serve more people by inviting friends and acquaintances to visit us and by reaching out to returning visitors.
- Increase UUCC's visibility in the community. This is an area that definitely needs improvement. Studies find that advertising is not terribly effective for churches. We are experimenting with a stronger web presence, as this is how most visitors find us. A renewed Social Justice program and stronger involvement in our surrounding communities is a must. (See the article on the Elk Grove Harvest Festival, page 7.) If you have ideas about connecting to our community and can help, talk to Martha and she will steer you toward the right person or group working on this.
- Find renters to sublet our space. Rev. Martha is looking into how we can increase our efforts here, including the possibility of using a commercial broker.
- Provide more transparency (better communication) on budget issues. Improve Board communications with members. The Board has approved plans to do this by posting Board meeting agendas on our website prior to meetings so that members may be encouraged to attend or submit items for consideration; post Board meeting minutes in draft form and update these promptly; include a regular financial report in the "members only" portion of our website; use our website to communicate Board items of special or immediate concern and notify members of such postings through our weekly e-mail.
- Begin a Planned Giving Program. This is now underway, thanks to Laura Osborne and Dick Tarble. See the article on page 6 of this newsletter.
- Begin looking for a new space. We have formed a New Home Task Force consisting of Dick Tarble, Sonia Duffoo, Jim Eastman, Tonie Darling, Jim Skow and Nina Weiler-Harwell. This group is charged with exploring our various options (renting, buying, building) and associated costs; making a recommendation to the congregation; looking for the right space; and organizing a capital fund drive in 2010 to pay for our new home and moving costs.

The Board sincerely appreciates your ideas and has moved to act on them if feasible. Don't hesitate to speak with a Board member to suggest matters of concern and possible solutions. We have repeatedly shown that, together, we can work through any challenge. Our current financial difficulties are no exception.

Sharing Our Knowledge, Sharing Our Resources

Rev. Martha writes:

We've all heard about the "sandwich generation." More and more of us find ourselves responsible for caring for both children and aging parents or other relatives. Making wise decisions for our elders can be painful and confusing, and raises questions about our own mortality. How can your church help?

First off, we can be available to one another as friends. If you are caring for someone with a chronic illness or condition, or with special needs associated with aging, don't hesitate to ask others for support! If you could use encouragement or practical assistance, let me know or give Jane Thompson or Teri Mckown a call. Jane and Teri are co-coordinators of our Pastoral Care Team and can arrange for transportation, meals, respite care, visits, and just plain moral support. And don't forget that I always welcome your calls.

Secondly, we can benefit from each other's experiences. Please see the next article below for how you can help compile a list of recommended professionals.

And third, we can all think about leaving a bequest (of any size) to UUCC. We all want to pass our assets on to the people and causes dearest to our hearts in the assurance that they will be made good use of. Next month, we will be hearing about one such member of UUCC, Hattie Peterson, whose bequest enabled us to establish our endowment fund. But you don't have to have a large estate to be thinking about how future generations might benefit from your years of hard work and savings.

We are beginning to put together a program that addresses this. We have long talked about wanting to be able to give people information about end-of-life issues which includes documenting wishes for our care and the disposal of our property. The UUA provides a good deal of information on how to develop a "Planned Giving" program that encourages members to remember their churches in their wills. I am very grateful to Laura Osborne and Dick Tarble for stepping up to help put such a program into place at UUCC.

Read on to see how this effort might involve you!

New! Planned Giving Task Force

A new task force, Planned Giving, has formed at UUCC. This task force has been formed to:

- Ask congregants to consider leaving a bequest to our church and
- Help congregants plan for their later years

Navigating the maze of options in the later years is not easy. Do you make a living trust or a will? Who do you want to honor in your trust or will? What about a health care proxy? Is long-term health care insurance worth it? How do I plan for the future financially?

We will need your help for our first task: making a "UUCC Yellow Pages" of helpful professionals. Do you know a professional in the Sacramento area who did a fantastic job drawing up your living trust? Did a professional help you find assisted living for a loved one? If so, we want to know. This valuable information will be compiled to provide help for those in our congregation seeking a referral in the Sacramento area.

You should receive a survey by e-mail or mail this month. Copies are also available at church. We look forward to getting your input soon.

Are You a Good Buddy?

It's very exciting when we have visitors at church on Sunday, and even more so, when they come back a second or third time. But it's hard being a new person, and even harder to make the effort to come back if you don't feel welcome. We have something very special to share here at UUCC, but are we all doing the most we can so that our visitors feel comfortable enough to come back several times to really get to know us?

The Membership Committee would like to suggest that members take the time to meet visitors, and then take that extra step to let them know they are welcome in our community. When you find you are compatible, do you remember to follow up with them? Do you greet them warmly the next time you see them? Do you call them or e-mail if you hear of an activity you think they'd like? If you aren't all that much alike, do you introduce them to other members with whom they would share an interest? These are just a few of the things you can do to reach out and turn visitors into members.

They say a person will form a relationship with a church they are interested in if they make three friends there. But if they don't, no matter how much we meet their needs or are the right place for them, we will lose them. If UUCC is the right place for them, how sad to think they'd leave just because no one took the time to reach out. We are a friendly group - we're lots of fun ! But to someone standing alone, we might feel exclusionary. So pull that new person into your conversation circle at coffee. Offer to drive with them to an event. Ask how their sick mother is, or about their job search, or what book they just read.

The Membership Committee has put together a list of actions you can take to help visitors feel welcome - it's called the "Buddy List". Other ideas: interview them for the newsletter; discuss a service; invite them to join you for coffee or a meal; do a task with them; or invite them to attend a welcome session with the minister. Copies of the list are available from committee members or the greeters. Membership Committee members are: Sonia Duffoo, Rebecca Fain, Ernie Tomasilli, Frieda Fergus and Tonie Darling.

Chalice Circle News

We now have four facilitators trained and ready to go when our Chalice Circles begin meeting this month. Rebecca Fain, Stephan Lange, Gayle Newman and Jim Eastman will be facilitating two Chalice Circles: a Wednesday evening group will meet twice a month to discuss topics of their choice and a Sunday afternoon group will meet twice a month to talk about that month's sermons or other UU-related matters. Thanks to Candy Wood, Teri McKown and Paula Braxton for helping Rev. Martha to get these off the ground! If you are interested in joining a group or simply have questions, let Candy or Teri know right away.

These two Chalice Circles will meet until sometime in December and after the second meetings, their membership will be limited to those who have signed up for them. This will allow their participants to build the sense of intimacy and trust that CCs depend on. Both groups, as well as any others that may be ready to go at that time, will open to new members in January. The Chalice Circles that result from the re-shuffling process will continue to meet bi-weekly until the end of our church year in June.

Also beginning in September, there will be a monthly Chalice Circle that will remain open so that newcomers and others who want to try out CCs before committing to one will have a chance to see what they are all about. The curious are encouraged to drop in! The time and day of this open group will be announced.

Those of you who indicated interest in a Chalice Circle by signing up last winter will be contacted by our organizers, but everyone is welcome to let Candy or Teri know if you would like to participate. We hope you will find that these groups add new depth to your UUCC experience!

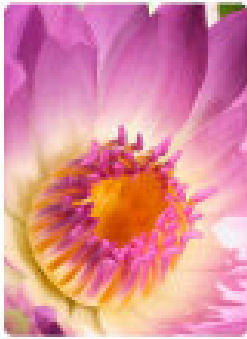
- We need a small shade structure (max. 10 ft wide) to put over the UUCC table.

Thank you to Dick Tarble for providing new UUCC t-shirts for sale in the sanctuary as well as UUCC refrigerator magnets.

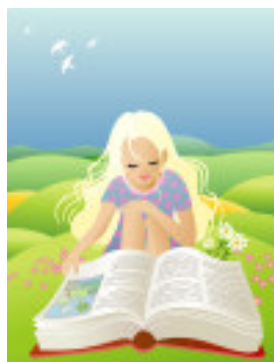
Congratulations to Jane Thompson and Marion Randall on completing their graduate study programs! Well done!
